Following the Meeting the Parish Clerk contacted the Planning Dept. Planning Legislation changed in July to allow Permission in Principle (PIP) applications.

Following the application for PIP the applicant will apply for Technical Detail Consent (the equivalent to Full planning, but I can't tell whether it is actually as detailed as it doesn't seem to ask for the ecology survey's etc), at this point the Planning obligations can be agreed, which appear to be the equivalent of conditions in a full planning permission.

Under this new regime CIL may still apply for some developments. This PIP regulation has been brought in to enable smaller builders to secure funding.
