Parish Council News

Road safety: the new 20mph limit

As stated in the last Newsletter, we were disappointed about the quality of the 20mph installation in our village. We'd tried to have it extended to include the top of Edgewell Lane and Lower Lane, plus the part of Eaton Lane joining the two, as this is used by many church-goers and visitors to the Jessie. We also expected that in each placement, there would be two posts and signs and some road markings. However, some of the posts were loose in the ground and the sign near Elm Tree Court is hidden by a hedge and on the wrong side of the road.

We therefore had plenty of material for a meeting with the Highways personnel (Jerry Gibbs & Ian Lovatt) of Cheshire West & Chester Council. This took place on 11th April, with members of our Road Safety Working Group in attendance. Our points were supported by our Ward Councillor, Eveleigh Moore Dutton, but the response wasn't very positive. A reduction of funds available was the main reason given for our woes and we were told that all installations met the standards. However, we pointed out that this didn't excuse poor quality or wrongly sited signs. We've also asked for evidence of the legality of the signs. Negotiations continue and we are awaiting further information.

Other issues discussed at the meeting included :

- **School expansion:** The need for further expertise to assist with potential parking / traffic volumes which will result from the school expansion.
- **Red Lion site development:** The need for liaison between Highways and the site developers, due to cars entering and exiting from the five new houses onto a busy road with known speed concerns.
- **The Cross:** Further recent accidents / near misses at this junction show that this area needs a re-think.
- **Beech Lane / Brownhills Lane junction:** Visibility is poor when crossing Beech Lane at this junction, due to the protruding embankment.

Oulton Mill Picnic Area

Much has happened at the picnic site on Brownhills Lane over the last couple of months. At the end of February, our contractors, TP Construction, started to remove some hedging and the old gate to make way for a new tarmac lay-by and surrounding fencing. The work is now complete and looks excellent. There was also a need to create a smooth, sloped bank ready for seeding. The Parish Council are most grateful to Martin Boardman and Dave Plumbley, who brought in equipment, free of charge, to make short work of producing a quality job. Further thanks go to Dave, who then sowed the grass seed and, having levelled the 'hump', made sure that all stones and brick ends were removed ready for final levelling by our farmer Councillors, Eddie and Arthur, so that grass mowing can resume for the summer.

With the rough work on the entrance finished, Working Group Chair Mike Wilson was joined by Councillor Jade Plumbley and Ward Councillor Eveleigh Moore Dutton for a morning of tree planting (110 donated whips of Hazel; Blackthorne; Crab Apple; Dog Rose etc.) plus taping off the newly seeded area.

With the initial grant mostly spent, further major work on the area will have to wait whilst new funding is found. If you have contacts for funding or ideas, please contact Lindsey. Again, thanks to all those mentioned above and to other members of the Working Group who in various ways are supporting the efforts.

Red Lion site

All residents of the Parish were invited to a presentation by developers Apex Construction & Developments, held in the public speaking time of the Parish Council Meeting on 21st March. Director Emma Leslie and her team gave details of how the design of houses had been decided and showed layouts being considered. Questions and opinions were invited from the 32 residents attending and a lively discussion ensued.

The overall conclusion was that, after five years of the site looking a mess, all were pleased that a new development will make an attractive change to one of the key entrance points to our village. The design of the houses was discussed, with residents liking the fact that many aspects are being built out of local materials. It was felt that the rural image of the village needs to be reflected in the design, and the option of three-story houses was questioned. With most of the trees staying, the front elevations showed that more greenery will be evident, which again gives an attractive image. Emma took on board comments about the importance of the entrance design and will have this looked at by their landscape team. Similarly the question of road safety on this busy road was raised and it was agreed that 'Highways' should be involved.

It was felt that the meeting had been a very useful exercise and the Apex representatives took away these points for consideration. Emma Leslie attended the April Parish Council meeting to give an update on their discussions and asked for the following to be put into this newsletter:

"Apex would like to thank all the residents that came to the March Parish Council Meeting to view our plans for the site. There was a great turn out and Apex thoroughly enjoyed meeting with all the local residents and getting an understanding of everyone's individual visions for the site.

Apex confirm that there will now be 5 houses as opposed to 6 and plan to change the designs of the houses to flow over two floors (not three). We are currently working with a fantastic team who will be producing a landscape impact assessment. Apex are also working with Highways to produce access with the highest levels of visibility for both residents and road users. We are looking forward to delivering an exceptional piece of work.

Broadband Update – ‘Connecting Cheshire’

At the February Parish Council Meeting at Jessie Hughes on 21st February, representatives of ‘Connecting Cheshire’ and BT attended to give an update and answer questions about broadband in our Parish. Again we were told that remote rural areas are on the list but actual commencement of the work is dependent on funding, which is released once or twice per year. Councillor Neil Thompson (who looks after our broadband interests) again asked that our Parish be given some priority due to the increasing number of businesses being run from households. Neil continues to look at new ways that have worked for some rural parishes in a similar situation to ours.

The Jessie Hughes Village Hall

Regular 'community' events at the hall, such as quiz and film nights, have now more or less come to a halt. Looking back at the last six months, the quiz and film nights have all been very successful. The average attendance has been very good and might have been an all-time high. The last quiz of the season was run by Church members and any profit goes to the church. The quiz and film season might have ended, but Tea'n'Chat carries on regardless and is as popular as ever. Don't forget – it's on the third Thursday of every month from 10:30am until noon. It's just 50p for tea, coffee, biscuits, cake and, most importantly, a chat.

Attendance from local residents at the AGM on 4th April was minimal – in fact, just one – and she's married to the Chairman and our Hall Manager! However, we take comfort by assuming that the community is comfortable with what we're doing and confident that our financial affairs are in good hands. The Chairman noted that we'd been active in maintaining the hall to a high standard, which is a very significant factor in keeping all those who hire the hall for clubs and activities very satisfied. He also noted that we've been able to give significant support to local charities by letting them use the hall free of charge. He added his sincere thanks to all the committee members, and others, who give so much of their time to keeping everything at the hall running smoothly.

David Bailey, our Treasurer, presented the financial results immaculately as usual. The gross receipts for the year were £20,878 (2015: £18,612), of which £14,262 related to hall hire income. Total bank and cash balances at the year-end amounted to £26,591 (2015: £29,972), which is encouraging as some £11,000 was spent on significant hall maintenance during the year. Our assets, including the hall and our equipment, are £278,853.

We're a charity (reg no: 510073) and our summary accounts can be seen on the Charity Commission website, but anyone who would like a copy of the full accounts can get one by contacting the Secretary directly.

The existing committee members had all volunteered to stand again for the coming year and were elected without dissent. The

officers were similarly re-elected at the normal committee meeting which always follows the AGM. So – the ship sails steadily on!

It was noted at this meeting that on-going maintenance work to relay the slabs on the terrace and further electrical work will cost up to £8,000 and this will significantly eat into our cash and bank reserves. Moreover, the hall committee has set a policy which says that we should maintain reserves of about twice our annual turnover (i.e. about £40,000) to deal with any unforeseen disasters. So, we shall be well down on that target and shall need to continue working hard to rebuild our security.

On a positive note, the drain problem which I reported in the last newsletter seems to have been fixed – but we still don't know why it happened in the first place. Drains can be expensive to fix so we are currently happy – but they are in on-going inspection mode. The Chinese are reported to be using face-recognition technology to track down excessive users of lavatory paper. We considered this, but decided that it might be regarded as slightly excessive!

Help is needed on Sunday June 11th! *The Jessie hosts a major charity cycle race each year, providing tea/coffee and beans on toast. This is also a significant fund raiser for the hall. If you can spare a couple of hours or so to help make toast/dish out beans for a period between 9.00am and 12.00 noon, your help would be hugely appreciated. Tarporley War Memorial Hospital



Thank you to everyone who has been supporting the hospital as it battles to survive. We raised £1,000 in February from a super Musical Evening in the Jessie and the Grand National Draw has raised just under £3,000. This is wonderful but it costs some £3,000 per day to run the hospital, which is why the fundraising events are only part of the solution. The hospital is a charity, not NHS, and as things stand it won't survive beyond 2019, its centenary year.

Jan Freeman and Brian Byrne have launched an Eaton TWMH Fundraising Group and hopefully many of you will have received a leaflet explaining why the hospital urgently needs increased help and how you can contribute. Regular donations are key, no matter how small. If everyone in the hospital catchment area gave just £25 per year, the current annual operating deficit of £330,000 would be eliminated.

Eaton already does much to support the hospital but we hope that by establishing a wider and successful framework for broad-based support, all the other villages will follow our example in support of the hospital. STOP PRESS: Brian has secured a grant from the Co-op. There are three charities selected and people have to choose which to support, with 1% of their Co-op spending going to this cause.

The funds will buy an electric bed for palliative care patients, reducing the risk of falls, and giving better infection and pressure control and care. **PLEASE ASK PEOPLE TO SUPPORT THE HOSPITAL BY CHOOSING IT AS THEIR CHARITY.** Co-op members can do this online but if you haven't signed up, it's easy to do. This project could be worth £2,500. Brian will fund raise the extra needed to buy the bed, which will cost £3,700.
